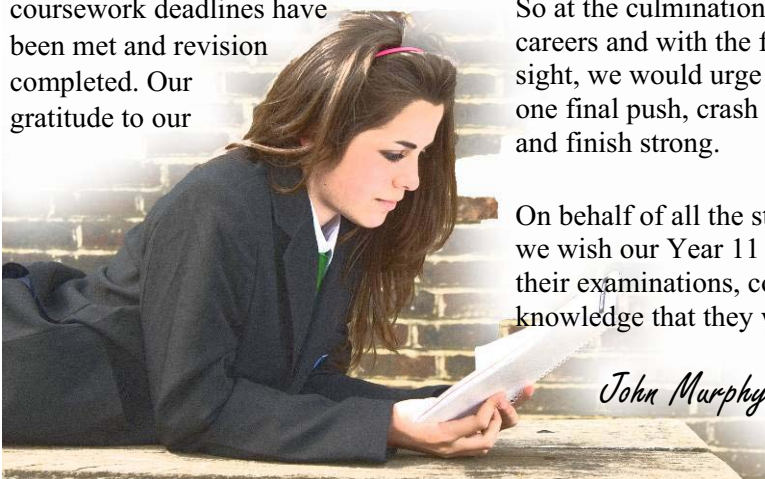

Coulsdon Academy continues to flourish. The excellent leadership of the Executive and Associate Principals is very well supported by the cohesive senior team. Their very strong teamwork continues to drive progress so that all staff feel involved in striving to give the Coulsdon students the best possible opportunities to succeed.

Students respond well to the 'meet and greet' procedures of the morning routines.

JUDGEMENTS FROM EDUCATION

Two Consultants spent a day at the Academy

Attendance has improved significantly.... It stands at just over 91%... However, these figures include those students who have never attended despite heroic efforts to reach the families and also the days lost through the especially inclement weather this winter. A more genuine figure is 95% a significant improvement on previous years. Punctuality to school has also improved and is close to 97%. This is a real success.

The recent drive to improve literacy has so far been successful with two thirds of the students targeted making at least three months progress in their reading ages.



Our Partnership for Success

Fixed-term exclusions are very low and permanent exclusions reduced to one. This is again excellent progress on previous years.

26% of Year 11 already have a grade C or better in Humanities, 24% in RE and 23% in Mathematics. 42% of students already have a grade C or better in Science modules. This data demonstrates clearly that the Academy has good capacity to improve the attainment of its students.

CONSULTANTS' 4TH MONITORING VISIT

on 15th May and this is what they found...

The Well-Being Centre is going from strength to strength and supports not only students but also their families. The nurse is able to forge very quick and effective links with the relevant agencies to ensure students get the best possible help very quickly and to ensure their safety.

Coulsdon has maintained the momentum generated at the beginning of the Academic year and is well on track to make good progress by the end of its first year. There has been overall steady progress since the last monitoring visit and students are on track to do well in examinations.



Ski Trip



On Wednesday 13th May staff, parents and students enjoyed a wonderful evening reflecting on their Ski America trip to North Conway in New Hampshire USA. Photographs and stories were shared by many and as I look back to the trip, that seems so long ago now, it was wonderful see students and staff having so much fun.

It all started back in March with students raring to get to the dry slopes to see what skiing was about. We could not ask for more: the sun was out, the slopes were dry and Mr McCullagh was fantastic in a very fetching red and white polo shirt (he asked me to write that!). Students advanced very quickly to the surprise of the instructors and moved onto the bigger slope. It was not the slope that proved to be the biggest challenge but the rope lift to actually get us to the top! It always provides a great photo opportunity as the force of the drag almost pulls the new skiers out of their boots! We all survived and surprisingly in one piece. The sense of achievement was fantastic with students saying 'that's easy and bring on the white stuff we can crack that mountain'.....that's the Oasis spirit.



Finally Friday 3rd April arrived and with suitcases packed we departed to Heathrow airport. We had planned for a

long day travelling but it seemed to pass quickly and on reflection this was down to the students. The conversations never stopped throughout the day and spirits were very high. I have to say that tiredness was starting to settle in on the final leg to the hotel after the almost twelve hours of travelling but finally the hotel appeared on the horizon and after a very warm welcome from the ski company and hotel staff it was off to bed.

The hotel just like last year was fantastic. The rooms were well furnished and very plush with outstanding facilities.

Morning dawned and the best part of the American day had arrived....breakfast! Bacon, eggs, waffles, potatoes, more eggs, toast, cakes, yoghurts, more waffles and three cups of coffee. Ms. Leary was now set for the day (only joking - we all had salad and orange juice)! Wild Cat was the first three days of skiing and wild it was. With mixed weather students had to prepare for all that was thrown at them. Fun, fun, fun was the agenda and fun we had! Students soon found that the 'white stuff' was not as easy as the dry slopes but after a tricky start students started to find their feet (or should I say skis) and the groups started to move up the mountain.

Service, instruction, food, the views and the skiing is just out of this world. With tree lined long runs it is just heaven. The weather was not so good which was a shame but again the group did not let this get them down. Second day here was fantastic but sadness

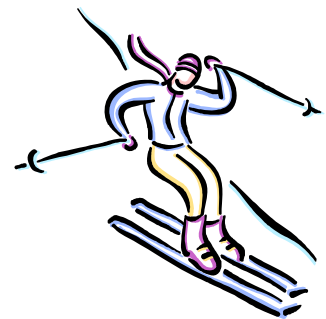

With a final chance to spend their last dollars they maximised the opportunity to buy last minute gifts for family and friends.

Once again America had proved to be the best with a genuine welcome, heartfelt generosity and superb facilities. We are left thinking it cannot get any better.

The journey home seemed to pass quickly and no sooner had I sat back on the plane were we touching down at Heathrow

On the 9th of May, twenty-three of our most talented dancers took part in Dance for Life, one of the biggest youth dance events in the South East organised by the British Red Cross.

The aim of the Dance for Life project is to raise funds and to engage young people in the work of the Red Cross through the power of dance. Dance is used as a medium to overcome cultural, social and physical barriers.

Miss Van der Berg helped our students to choreograph a dance: a 3 to 8 minute routine that reflected aspects of the Red Cross work. After many hours of practising, our students finally had a chance to show-off their skill.

Since 2006 over 5000 young people have taken part in Dance for Life and raised over £64,000.00 for the Red Cross. This year the competition was tough and our students put on a brilliant performance.



SHELTON AIMING TO HELP THE EAGLES SOAR!

Year 9 striker Shelton Gooden has been snapped-up by Crystal Palace Football Academy and is now a regular player for their Under 14 squad.

These are the words that express the amazing architecture; The Shri Swaminarayan Madhir.

Myself and other 27 students from Oasis Academy Coulsdon witnessed the beauty of this creation which was inspired by His Divine Holiness Pramukh Swami Maharaj, the leader of BAPS Swaminarayan Sanstha and the fifth spiritual successor of Bhagwan Swaminarayan, is recognised, not only as a prominent spiritual Hindu leader, but also as a 'master builder' for inspiring the creation of this Mandir, the largest Hindu temple outside India.

I found the day a really cultural experience. The views were breathtaking and I got to have a greater understanding of my religion Hinduism. The Highlight of the day was watching how the temple was designed with 5,000 tonnes of Italian Carrara marble and the finest Bulgarian limestone, it was hand-carved into 26,300 pieces by 1,526 skilled craftsmen. Ancient Indian art and traditions have been encompassed in this house of worship that has won accolades the world over in under 3 years! Not forgetting the pristine prayer hall and actually seeing the delicate scenery craved with elephant head and lotus flowers.

I absolutely enjoyed the day and with huge gratitude for the teachers to took their own time for taking us. I will never forget the experience ever again!
