Dear Parents and Carers,

I am honoured to write my first Newsletter message since being appointed as Associate Principal. John Murphy and I have worked in close partnership since before the Academy opened, spearheading the plans for our transformation and I am delighted that this strategic partnership will continue under John's shared leadership of both

Academies.

As I am sure you are now all aware Oasis has been asked to partner with the Local Authority to create the first all-through Academy to replace Ashburton Community, Infant and Junior Schools from September 2009. This process is, of course, subject to consultation but we are extremely proud and excited to be given this potential opportunity to transform the lives of many more young people. As I have explained to all of the students in their assemblies last week, we are extremely proud of **them**, the rapid progress they have made and transformation that they, in partnership with all the staff here and you the parents and carers, are going through.

We cannot underestimate the impact that our dedicated team of staff have made in this process, something that was identified by our inspectors who wrote that staff are **'Going the extra mile for the students'**. It is as a result of this progress and transformation that Oasis has been approached and we have been delighted at our students' response to the plans for a Sister Academy.

We acknowledge, as do the students, that we are on a journey to become a Centre of Excellence and that we have some way still to go. We have the highest expectations and aspirations and can assure you that we will not be complacent. As Anish and Anisha, two Year 10 students who opened the Oasis National Forum (see Page 4 for details), asserted to the collection of Principals and Executive members: **'Through our continued Partnership for Success – WE KNOW we're going to get there'**.

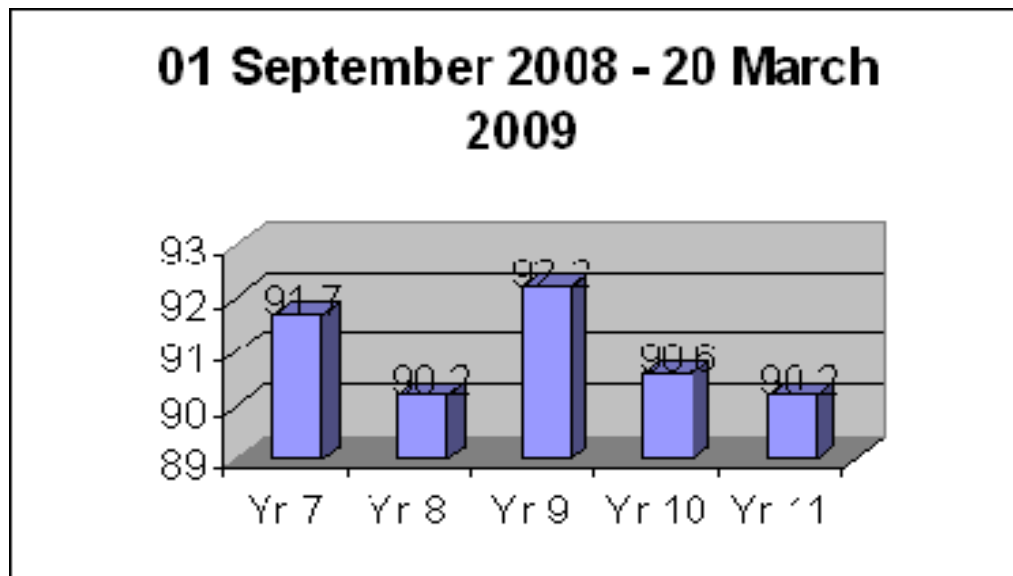


Cllr Robert Askey listened intently to the views of the students.

A massive thanks to Mrs. Buckingham and Mrs. Smith for all of their advice and generous help in preparation!

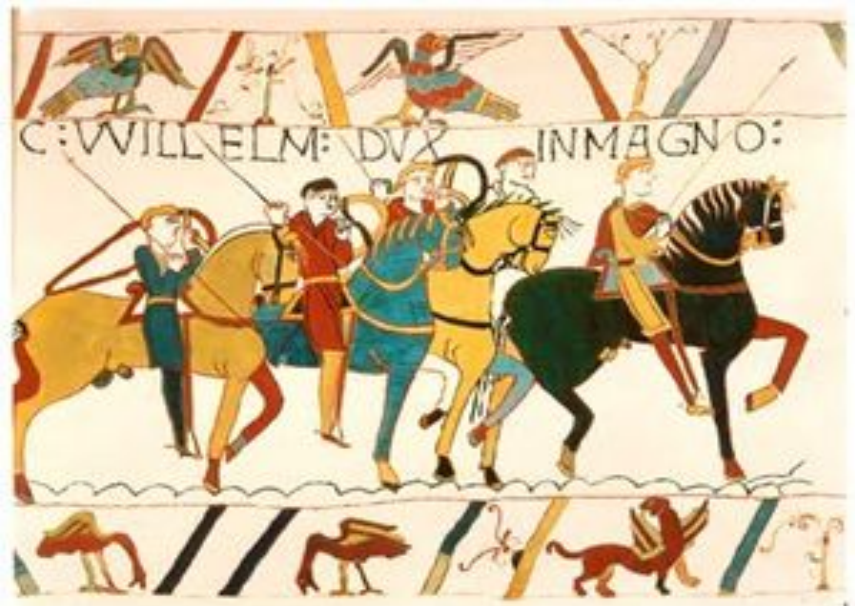


HISTORY

Art visit to the National Portrait Gallery

To start the new GCSE theme 'Identity ' off with a bang the art department took 55 students to the National portrait gallery. We then moved on to begin in the contemporary gallery with portraits of household names, such Richard Branson. Incidentally his portrait is huge and is made in an unconventional manner, using postcards as a collage material.

The young artists selected a portrait and began to sketch. They made some superb transcriptions which will carry marks towards their GCSE course-work. One of the portraits that caught many students eyes was a huge portrait done in pencil, which at first glance could have been a photograph. The students were really stretched with their level of skill. Mrs Wallis, being a keen artist herself, came along and made some great sketches with which the students were most impressed.

The second part of the tour was studying 'Identity' through the eyes of a photographer. The **Taylor Wessing Photographic Portrait prize '08** exhibition was on and was very impressive. The photographers had captured the essence of an individual in a single shot. One of my favourites was an exploration of Dutch portrait painting but with a sharp wit (see the picture to the right).

DRAMA

The Drama department took 35 students from Years 9 and 10 to see "Blood Brothers" at the Phoenix Theatre, London. Year 10 have been studying the play and the issues contained within the story as preparation for their GCSE course.

The play documents the life of twins, Mickey and Edward, born to Mrs Johnstone, but separated at birth. Edward is given to Mr & Mrs Lyons, a wealthy couple who are unable to have children. Whilst growing up the boys meet and become best friends, despite the attempts by their parents to keep them apart.

The play is woven with many issues relating to class, poverty, debt, addiction and superstition, to name but a few. The dramatic conclusion comes when the boys, now grown up and residing in different worlds, argue and have their relationship revealed to them. They both die.

The play has been a tremendous hit with the students who have embraced the storylines as stimuli for their own devised Drama. The visit to the professional performance was very much the "icing on the cake". All the students loved the experience, admitting that it really brought the characters of Mickey and Edward to life.

It was a joy to witness the students involving themselves in the story and a particular pleasure for we members of staff, privileged to escort such a well-behaved and polite group of young people.

DANCE FOR LIFE

Students participating in the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme will soon be taking part in a two-day practise for their hiking/map reading assessment.

The group has benefitted enormously by the generous donation from the McCutcheon family, in memory of Alan McCutcheon, Rotary Club member and former Governor of Coulsdon High School. In consultation with the family it was decided that the donation be spent on a number of large 3-person tents which are ideal as students are required to complete a 2-day overnight hiking expedition. We have also purchased some of the more expensive items of equipment and walking gear which will be available for loan.

Our Year 10 Dance students are performing in the "Dance for life" production run by the British Red Cross.

It is one of the biggest performances in the UK, over 5000 young people have taken part in the past!

It opens up dance as a medium to overcome cultural, social and physical barriers, giving pupils the chance to perform and celebrate with their friends, family and school.

It's been a busy half term for our dancers and samba drummers with performances at the Academy, at Haling Manor High School and at The Fairfield Halls in Croydon!

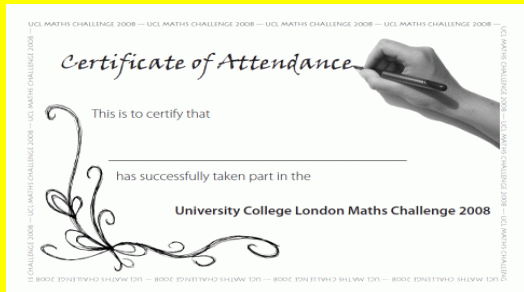

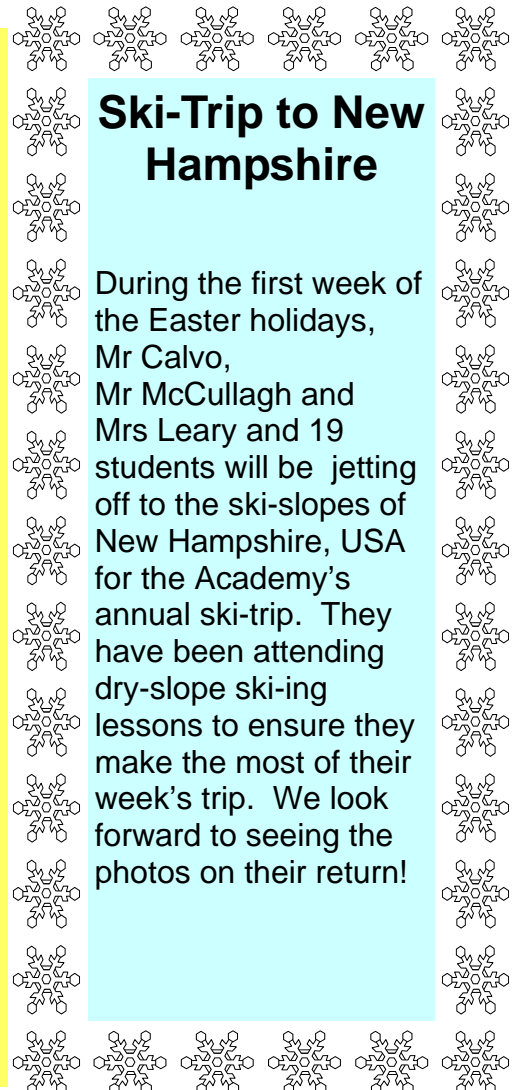

This half term Year 9 have been focussing on their Option choices. We were delighted to see such a high turnout of students and parents at our Options Evening when Mr Millar & Mr Pelling explained the process. The Academy has devised new Option Pathways for students specifically targeted to help all students within the year group gain academic qualifications and accreditations throughout their Key Stage 4 programme of study. Students have been very prompt in returning their forms and we are currently writing the timetable for September, based on their choices.

As reported earlier in the newsletter Year 9 attendance has been some of the best in the school but it definitely needs to be better as they start their GCSEs.

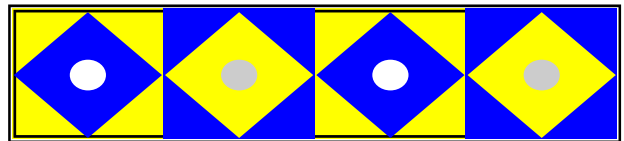
100% punctuality and full equipment need to be in place.
