Environment Council

The Environment Council were visited by a civil engineer to help them carry out an audit on the impact of the school on the surrounding area. Students have looked at energy use, water use, waste the school produces, the impact of how we travel to school and our impact on biodiversity. The work replicates that of those employed to minimise the environmental impact of organisations of all sizes.

It has informed schemes that will be run throughout the next academic year which include planting to improve biodiversity awareness campaigns to reduce energy waste, and schemes to encourage reuse and recycling.

We hope that all the students involved enjoyed their experience of instrumental lessons and are excited to see how those who have continued lessons will grow and develop as musicians.




Legoland-Year 7 Maths Coding Trip

European Day of Languages

YEAR 7 GEOGRAPHY RIVERS TRIP

This half term we went on a Geography trip to look at rivers. We go onto the coach and went to our first destination, Crossways Farm. There we put our wellies and went to the first river. It was a meander and we measured the width and the depth of it; then did a velocity test (speed at which it takes to get one side to the other) using a cork and stopwatch. We put the cork in the water and let the current take it for three metres and then we stopped the stopwatch. Our time was six seconds. This shows you haw fast the current is.

Next we got back on the coach and headed for the second river. The second river was a straight river that had a very fast current. We did the same as last time; checking the depth, width and velocity. But this one was harder because when we were measuring it we had to be careful not to let the measuring tape go in the river because the current was very strong. Then to measure the depth we had to find 20cm, put a ruler into the water and place our finger on where the water ends on the ruler - that gave the depth.

Finally we went to the last river, this river was a straight like the previous one but it was extremely deep. The current was the strongest yet. We repeated the same tests as before and found out that the time was half as fast as the previous one for velocity. And the depth was twice as deep.

It flowed fastest on the outside and pushed it towards the outside of the meander.

Geography Trip to Eastbourne Report by Jacob Phillips & Ashana Rose, Year 8




