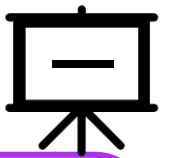

You might need a **pen and paper** if you want to complete some of these activities.



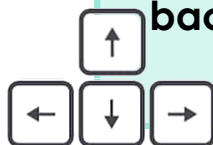

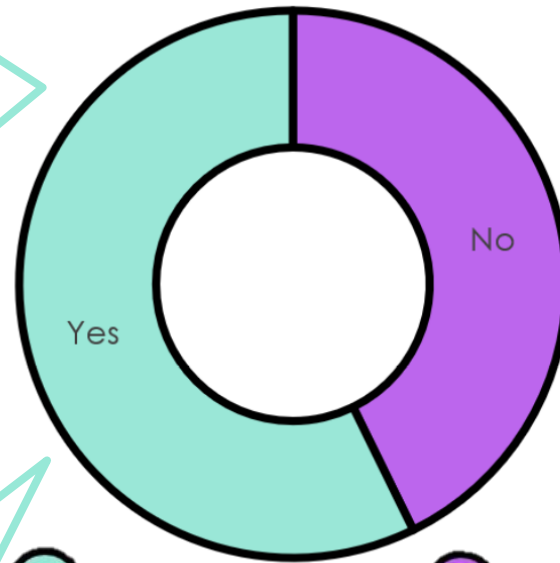

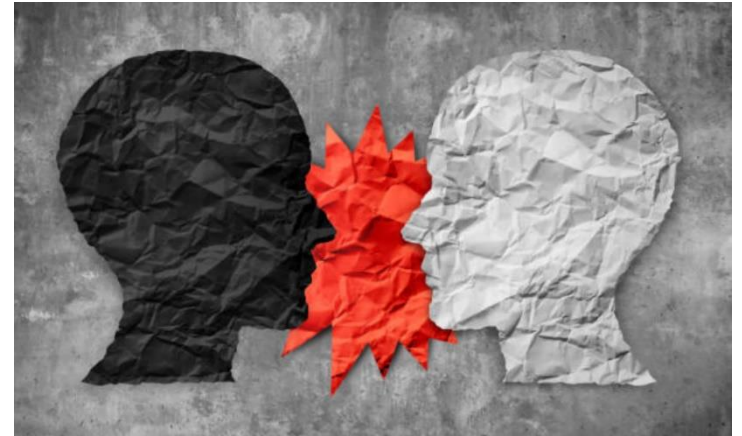

2 What is systemic racism?



Racism is the unconscious (or conscious belief) that your **colour, ethnicity, nationality or race** is superior to another's . This could mean that **they are treated differently** (racial discrimination).

When you think of racism, you might think of groups of people **saying hurtful comments or making unfair stereotypes**. While this is true, and you should speak out when this happens, **it can be more complicated than this.**

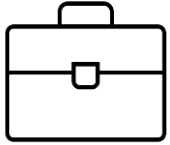


When people in a society hold racist views, **it can affect the way the whole country works.** We call this **systemic racism**.

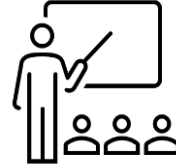


Systemic racism can be more difficult to see in person, but there are lots of statistics that suggest that it is **happening...**

2 What is systemic racism?



Black Americans are 2x **more likely to be unemployed** than white Americans¹.

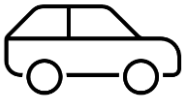


Black Americans are 3x **more likely to be excluded from school** than white Americans².

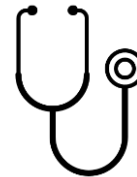
Only 13% of people in the US are black, yet **40% of the people in prison are black**³.



72% of white Americans own their own house, whereas only 42% of black Americans do⁴.



Black Americans are **30% more likely to be pulled over by the police** when driving⁵.



One study showed **67% of Doctors have a bias against African-American patients**⁵.

Question (1-2 min)

How do you think it would feel growing up in America, knowing these statistics?

Why are we talking about this?

On the 23rd February, Ahmaud Arbery, an unarmed black man, was **shot and killed** by Gregory and Travis McMichael while **he was out jogging as they thought he was a burglar²**. The two men were **charged with murder on the 7th May** after a video of the incident went viral.



On May 25th, George Floyd, an unarmed **black man**, was arrested for using a fake \$20 note. While Floyd was handcuffed, A police officer, Derek Chauvin, put his knee on Floyd's neck for **8 minutes 46 seconds**. Floyd was **unconscious for almost 3 minutes** before the police officer moved – the police officer only moved once asked to by the paramedics. Floyd died shortly after.

Videos went viral in which Floyd can be heard saying **"I can't breathe"** and witnesses pointing out that he wasn't moving. The officer in question has now been **charged with second degree murder**.

Also, on the 25th May Christian Cooper (a black man) asked Amy Cooper (a white woman, no relation) to put her dog on a lead because of the park rules protecting local wildlife. She refused. When he started filming her, she said she would **“call the police and say an African American man was threatening her life”**.

Since George Floyd's death, **protests have taken place across America**, as well as in Toronto, Berlin, London, Manchester and Cardiff¹. This is **despite the fact many of these cities remain in some form of lockdown** and are practising **social distancing**.



This isn't the first time that the **Black Lives Matter movement** has had to risk their safety and **take to the streets to demand change**. It was founded in the USA in **2013**², but there are now groups in countries around the world, and have had to **protest police brutalities a number of times**³.

However, many people feel like this time will be different – that more people are taking notice and understanding the importance of not just being 'non-racist' but openly opposing racism. **So will this time cause a real change?**

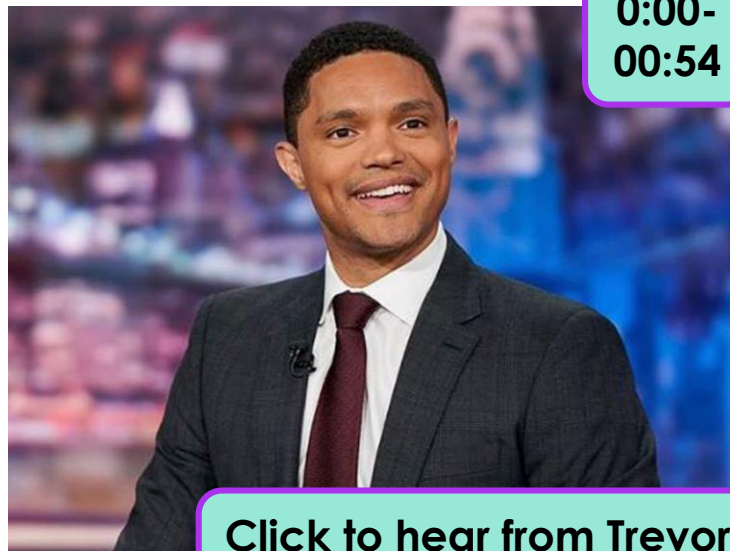

We barely get a sorry, we rarely get accountability and we never get change. **So what are people to do?"**



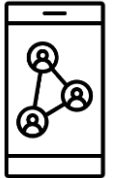

The police officer who knelt on his neck has been arrested and charged with **second degree murder and manslaughter**. In some past cases, officers have not been arrested.



After petitions and protests, the other police officers that were present have been charged with “aiding and abetting” murder, which means that though they didn’t kill him, they allowed his death to happen.

While the majority of protests have been peaceful, some have **turned violent**, with buildings being set **on fire** and shops being **looted**.



Some people have said that **violence doesn't help the cause**, while others have argued that **peaceful protests haven't worked in the past**, causing this to happen.

Other reports say that protests only **became violent after police officers tried to stop the peaceful protests**, but it is impossible to know the truth.

US President **Donald Trump** said he was “**sickened**” by the **death of George Floyd** and that “**justice will be served.**”

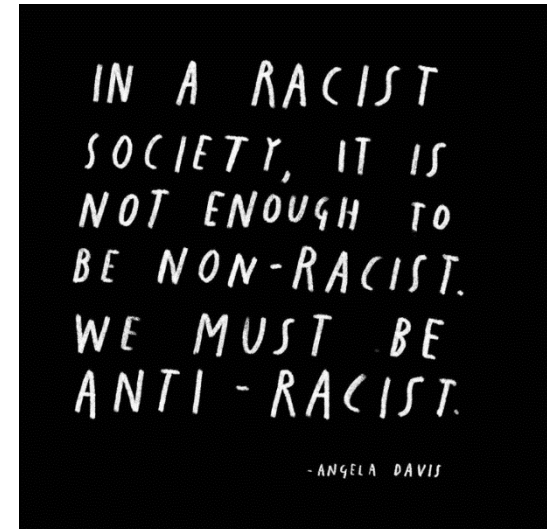
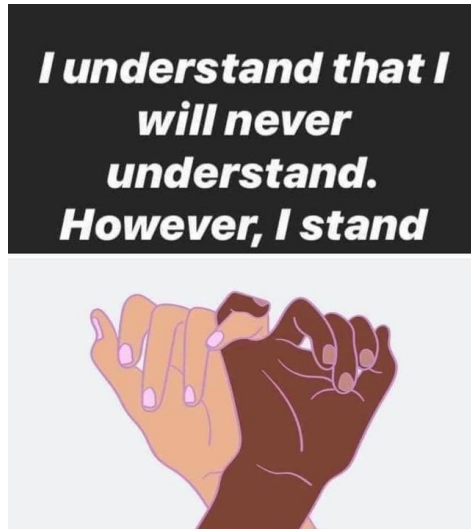
