Heartstone Project – Ms John reports

Selected Year 7 students have been involved in a project funded by The Mayor's Office for Policing and Crime (MOPAC). They have been reading a book called "The Heartstone Odyssey" which has a central character called Chandra who is an aspiring dancer. She battles prejudice and discrimination throughout but the book enables students to talk about strategies to overcome the variety of issues in the narrative.

The groups have produced some amazing artwork that corresponded to the chapters of the books, and were honoured to have these displayed at the Arts Showcase at the Academy and at Braithwaite Hall in Croydon. Many key members of the Croydon Community were invited such as the Deputy Mayor, Mark Healey from the Metro Charity, and Senior Members of the Metropolitan Police.

In June we celebrated the first Arts Showcase since 2019. Just over 60 students were involved in performances representing what has been going on in both classrooms and enrichment in Music and Drama. There was also some amazing work on display from Art, Resistant Materials and Textiles. We were incredibly proud to be able to let our students shine in what was an enjoyable evening for all.



HISTORY- OUT AND ABOUT

The Tower of London

Forty Year 7 students visited the Tower of London, where they looked at the 'White Tower'; a magnificent Norman Keep built by William the Conqueror. They were also able to see the Crown Jewels This magnificent, world-famous collection of 23,578 gemstones boasts items that are still used in royal ceremonies today, including the famous Koh-i-Nûr diamond, which is one of the most famous diamonds in the world. We also saw the famous ravens and visited the Bloody Tower which derives its name from the 1560s when the two princes are believed to have been murdered by their uncle Richard III in the upper chamber.

Hampton Court Palace

More recently another group of Year 7 students visited Hampton Court Palace. Students visited the Great Hall, which sits at the very heart of the Tudor palace, towering over the surrounding buildings. It was designed to impress and to proclaim Henry VIII's power and magnificence. They also looked at the external aspects of the palace including the famous astronomical clock. The central dial rotates once per lunar month and shows the time when the moon crosses the meridian each day – from which the tide can be read. The middle dial, rotating annually shows the age of the moon and the outer dial (2.5m wide) which also rotates once a year shows days, months, and the zodiac. On our way back to the Academy we looked at some of the famous gardens, together with an obligatory visit to the gift shop.

Whitechapel

Finally, 40 Year 9 students visited Whitechapel, taking part in a walking tour, examining the social and economic conditions of the east end of London during the late Victorian period, focussing particularly on overcrowding, sanitary conditions, and the failings of Sir Robert Peel's Metropolitan Police force to apprehend Jack the Ripper in 1888. Students were fascinated by the remaining narrow alley ways and the level




Oasis also took part in National Theatre New Views, where 6 students in year 10 wrote their own plays with the help of professional playwright Brain Mullins. National Theatre had 427 scripts submitted this year and these were narrowed down to the longlist of 117. Two plays were longlisted from Oasis, *Once Upon a Time* by Bonnie Edwards and Keira Grierson and *The Game of Bets* by Otis Michael-Reid.

I am so proud of every single one of them who took part, developing their own plays and know how much they learnt from this experience which will hold them in good stead for year 11. I am delighted to say that this will be running again next year also and see who our playwrights of the future are.

Drama- National Theatre Projects

This year Oasis took part in the National Theatre Connections Festival and what a wonderful opportunity this has been. Students in Years 9 – 11 who took part were rehearsed and performed one of the two plays were commissioned especially for 2021/2022 and our play was *Find A Partner!* The story is a bit like Love Island meets Squid Game and it was so fun to work with the students on this every Monday for six months.

As part of the programme, students had the opportunity to perform at The Lyric Hammersmith and this was the best day, one I'll never forget and I am sure the cast will not either. Nicolas Deeks said, 'thank you for doing Connections with us. It was such a blast the entire time and one of the best things I've had the chance to do at the school so far. I don't think I'll ever forget it. Especially doing "GOOOOOOOO LOVE!" over and over again.' It was so wonderful that I have applied again for next year as well, so fingers crossed."

St Paul's Cathedral Trip

People back in Jamaica were saying about how London is the golden city and England is the best country. But right now, I want to go home. Everything everyone said was a lie. It has been difficult. Excited, watching the television I was happy and hearing all the magical stories, places and freedom I was ready to go.
