London Fire Brigade - Electrical Safety

With November on its way we wanted to remind residents to think about electrical safety within the home.

Fire Crews will be talking to the Public about their "white goods" and e-bikes/scooters. You can visit any Fire station in the Borough Saturday mornings to get advice.

Fire safety and electrical items.

From white goods to faulty chargers, electrical items are the number 4 fire risk in the home.

In Croydon we have seen 12 fires this year from lithium batteries.

11 of these were e-bikes/scooters.

Must-knows for electrical device safety

1. Always make sure electrical appliances have a British or European safety mark when you buy them.
2. Keep electrical appliances clean and in good working order.
3. Don't buy cheap counterfeit chargers for items that use lithium batteries, and never leave phones or laptops plugged in to charge overnight
4. Empty fluff regularly from tumble dryers in line with the manufacturer's instructions.
5. Hair straighteners can get extremely hot – always switch them off and leave them to cool on a heatproof surface.
6. Try to keep to one plug per socket, especially for high powered appliances like washing machines, kettles.
7. Be lead safety savvy – cable drum extension leads should always be completely unwound to avoid overheating, and be careful not to overload extension leads.
8. Share your fire safety knowledge with the whole family – check the kids' chargers, and make sure everyone knows how to use electric blankets safely.

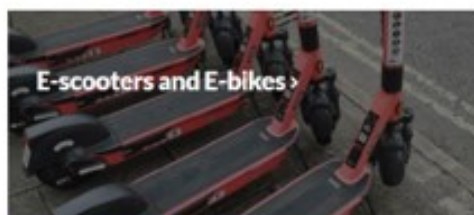


What do you need to know about large appliances and fire safety?

'White goods' are large appliances like tumble dryers, washing machines, fridges and freezers. Sadly we attend many fires – some of them fatal – caused by faulty electrical appliances.

So here's what you need to know to stay safe while you use these vital time savers.

- If you are concerned about the safety of a product stop using it and make your concern known to the retailer, manufacturer or your local Trading Standards office.
- Clean your tumble dryer filter after every load.
- Don't overload sockets with lots of energy hungry appliances – follow the one plug per socket rule.
- Take extra care with second-hand appliances, ensure they have been safety checked and are not listed on the product recall register.



E-scooters and E-bikes

Charging your e-bike or e-scooter

Always buy your e-bike or e-scooter from a reputable seller.

Never charge them whilst unattended or when you are sleeping. Fit a smoke alarm wherever you charge them.

There a number of ways you can reduce the risks when charging lithium batteries:

Only ever use the correct charger for your battery, otherwise you can greatly increase the risk of fire. Always buy any replacement chargers from a reputable seller.

Using the wrong charger could mean that too much power is put into the battery, leading to failure and a dangerous fire.

Always avoid general 'multi-plug' chargers that fit different models unless specifically approved by the battery manufacturer, as they may not provide the right power for your battery and may greatly increase the risk of fire.

The warning signs your e-bike or e-bike battery is a fire hazard

Heat: It's normal for batteries to generate some heat when charging or in use. However if your device's battery feels extremely hot to the touch, there's chance it's defective and may start a fire

Bulging: A battery bulging or swelling out of shape is a common sign of it failing. If your battery looks swollen, you should stop using it immediately.

Similar signs include any type of lump or leaking from the device

Noise: Failing lithium batteries have also been reported to make hissing or cracking sounds

Smell: If you notice a strong or unusual smell coming from the battery, this could also be a sign of it failing

Performance: A failure to fully charge or an excessively longer charge times can be a sign that your battery is failing

Smoke: If your battery or device is smoking, a fire has already started and you should get out, raise the alarm and call 999

If you break the behaviour Code

- You may receive a £100 penalty fare
- We may take away your 11-15 Zip Oyster photocard
- You may be given a criminal record

Dear Parents/carers

Re: Pharmacy First – an NHS service being offered from pharmacies across England for children and adults

I am emailing to let you know about an NHS service which pharmacies across England are offering for children (as well as adults) called **Pharmacy First**.

What is Pharmacy First?

This service enables children and adults to get quick access to healthcare advice as they can walk in to a pharmacy and access the service (some pharmacies also offer the service remotely as a video consultation). The person will then be offered a consultation with a pharmacist in a private consultation room. This service takes away the potential delay of having to wait for a GP appointment and may help ensure children get well and back to school as quickly as possible, as well as supporting parents/carers to also get better sooner if they are unwell.

The service supports primary school aged children in the below age groups who need help with:

- ✦ **Earache** (aged 1 to 17 years)
- ✦ **Impetigo** (aged 1 year and over)
- ✦ **Infected insect bites** (aged 1 year and over)

Sore throats (aged 5 years and over)

The service also supports older children and adults (so is applicable to you as parents/carers) in the below age groups who need help with:

- ✦ **Earache** (aged 1 to 17 years)
- ✦ **Impetigo** (aged 1 year and over)
- ✦ **Infected insect bites** (aged 1 year and over)
- ✦ **Sore throats** (aged 5 years and over)
- ✦ **Shingles** (aged 18 years and over)
- ✦ **Sinusitis** (aged 12 years and over)

Urinary tract infections (UTIs) in women (aged 16 to 64 years)

The pharmacist will provide advice and, if clinically necessary, offer an NHS medicine to treat the condition (these medicines are supplied free of charge to children under 16 years, with the normal [NHS prescription charge rules](#) applying to people aged 16 or over). The pharmacy will then send an electronic message to the person's GP surgery so their health record can be updated.

Should the pharmacist be unable to help, they will direct the person to their GP surgery or other health professional as appropriate.

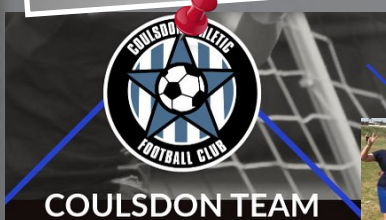
